## Chicanos/Latinos Discontent Manifest

(Editors Note: The following proclamation was issued by Herman Baca, Chairman of the Committee on Chicano Rights. The proclamation is in support of Border March which will take place Feb. 11, 12 Noon, at the San Ysidro Border Crossing.)

San Diego, CA. . 117 years ago in Puebla, Mexico, our people raised their voices against lyranny, against oppression and in the process expressed their deep seated desired for freedom and dignity. Today it is significant. that Pope John Paul II has chosen Puebla as the historical site for his first visitation with the Latin American Bishops.

Today, in 1979, we also raise our voices in a new cry of ourtrage because of the immigration issue and call for a national pretest march against the new tyranny of the spirit, the oppression of our civil rights and the degradation that is being perpetrated daily against Americas 16 million United States and Mexico...in minority..the Chicano Latino. oppression and denial of to la raza, is rapidly becoming streets! the Puebla of the 70's.

We have implored, petitioned and requested that our government not construct the proposed curtain of hatred between Mexico and the U.S., between Anglo-Americans and Chicanos/Latinos. Our

Rather than the continued maintanence of a border patrol which can only justify its existence through terror,

The San Diego Chamber of Commerce has urged President Carter to discuss border manufacturing plants and traffic delays at the San Ysidro crossing when he meets with Mexican President Lopez Portillo next month.

The two Presidents will meet in Mexico City Feb. 14-16.

As the ninth largest city in the United States, San Diego has an important stake in U.S.-Mexico border matters, the Chamber said this week in a letter to President Carter in which four agenda items were suggested.

Chamber President Carleton Lichty urged Carter to support increased emphasis by both governments on the Border Industrialization Program (BIP) under which twin U.S.-Mexico plants are established along the border, providing jobs for Mexican workers.

The Chamber also asked the President to discuss:

\*\* The "explosive" Mexican population, 42 per cent of which is age 16 or under, and the importance of creating jobs for these youths.

\*\* A possible "guest worker" program, under which Mexicans could be brought. into the U.S. for temporary jobs when legal resident workers are not available.

\*\* Excessive delays at the San Ysidro border gate and the need to speed up inspections

Lichty congratulated the President and wished him success in the talks with the Mexican leader.
